OUR FOUNDER
Servant of God Joseph Louis Ravel
(1824- 1881)

Rev. Fr. Louis Ravel, the Founder of the Congregation of the Franciscan Sisters of the Presentation of Mary, born on 24th August 1824 at Valerein, France, hailed from a family of landlords. He grew up with spiritual fervour and entered the Major Seminary of Foreign Missions. He was ordained as a Catholic priest on 17th June 1848.

Rev. Fr. Ravel, with a great humanitarian spirit, a humble mind, undeterred faith, benevolence and intelligence, paved the way to take up a missionary assignment with the M.E.P. Priests at Coimbatore, with Karumathampatti as its headquarters. His presence was like a breath of fresh air for the poor and the needy. He founded many institutions that mainly focused on the upliftment of the downtrodden through education.

His selfless service inspired him to establish the Congregation of Franciscan Sisters of the Presentation of Mary in 1863. Father Ravel firmly believed that only education at all levels would dispel the darkness of ignorance and so, sowed the seed of knowledge. The elementary schools, middle schools, high schools, Arts and Science colleges and Community Colleges, School of Nursing, and B.Ed. colleges established by the Presentation Congregation are the fruits of his prayer, vision and hard work. By founding institutions, dedicated to the greater glory of God, to the nation, to the society and specially for the empowerment of women servant of God Ravel has become God's own instrument in changing innumerable lives.

With 32 years of fruitful and selfless service as a faithful servant of God, this great visionary laid his life in the hands of Our Lord on 31st January 1881. Father Ravel's nobility of vision and mission will ever inspire generations of learners and his astounding foresight to empower women through education has reaped rich dividends. True to his vision today an empowered woman is powerful beyond measure.

He inspires his followers and those who prosper through his works- To live as the "living teaching of the great law of charity", which is the true foundation and beautiful summary of the Christian religion.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE COLLEGE

Nirmala College for Women is run by the Congregation of the Franciscan Sisters of the Presentation of Mary. It began as second Grade College in 1948. The College was founded by Msgr. Oubagarasamy, D.D., the visionary Bishop of Coimbatore to empower women through education. The College was started by the Coimbatore Diocese under the University of Madras and it is affiliated to Bharathiar University, Coimbatore since 1982.

Over the years, Nirmala College for Women has emerged as a premier institution in the education of women. The College propagates a holistic education that encourages intellectual excellence and moral values with its motto “Knowledge Purifies, Charity Enhances” and focuses on humanistic values.

Nirmala College for Women was first accredited in 2004 with ‘A’ grade by NAAC and conferred the Autonomous status in 2007. In the subsequent NAAC accreditations in 2011 & 2016 the College retained its ‘A’ grade with a high score of 3.62 CGPA.

The Department of Botany, Chemistry and Zoology were included under the ‘Star College Scheme’, Department of Biotechnology, Government of India in the year 2012-2013. In the year 2017, the Departments of Mathematics, Geography and Computer Science were brought under the Star College Scheme. In the same year, DBT conferred the “Star Status” to the Departments of Botany, Chemistry and Zoology, enhancing the resources for further procurement of equipment and conduct of activities. The College is recognized under DST-FIST at level - 0 from 2016-2017 onwards.

Examination Procedures (Autonomous)

The examination system is designed to ensure reliability and validity by evaluating the performance of the students during and at the end of the semesters. The institution follows the Semester pattern of examinations. UG Programmes have six Semesters and PG Programmes have four Semesters. The examination system has two components - Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) and End Semester Examinations (ESE). CIA is conducted to monitor the progress of the students during the course of the Semester and ESE at the end of the Semester after the completion of 90 working days.

Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA)

The components of CIA are Periodical Tests, Projects / Seminars / Quiz / Presentation and Attendance. Students are expected to take both the tests that are administered to them. Seminar and Paper presentations are compulsory at the Post-Graduate level. There is no passing minimum for the CIA.

End Semester Examinations (ESE)

Semester Examinations are conducted twice a year in November/ December and in April / May.

For UG programmes, a minimum of 40% in ESE and 40 % in aggregate (CIA +ESE) is required to get a passing minimum.

For PG programmes, a minimum of 50% in ESE and 50 % in aggregate (CIA +ESE) is required to get a passing minimum.

Each student should possess an Identification Card issued by the College with the passport size photograph duly attested by the Principal of the College and the same should be brought to the College every day and also on each day of the examination along with the hall ticket.

Semester System

All Under Graduate and Post Graduate courses are offered under the Semester System. Each academic year is divided into two Semesters (Odd & Even).

Fees

Fees has to be paid online through the College website www.nirmalacollegeonline.ac.in at the commencement of every Semester. If it is not paid within a week from the beginning of each semester, the student's name will be removed from the roll.

If a student leaves the College during her period of study, she does not have the right to claim remission of any portion of the Semester fees.

Day Order System

Under the Semester pattern, the College works for 180 days a year. Each semester will have a duration of 90 days of 5 hours each from 9.00 a.m. to 3.00 p.m.

The College follows the Day Order system and it is denoted by numbers 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 & 6 and the timetable will be followed accordingly in a continuous manner.

General Assembly

The General Assembly will be conducted regularly and every student is expected to attend the same.

Class Hours

The working day is divided into two sessions and each session into periods of one hour each. The morning session is from 09.00 a.m. to 12.15 p.m. and the afternoon session from 1.00 p.m. to 3.00 p.m.

At the first warning bell at 8.55 a.m., students should go to their respective classes for the Morning Prayer at 9.00 a.m. Strict silence should be observed during the prayer.

At the commencement of each hour when the teacher enters, the students are expected to stand up and respectfully greet her. The students likewise should stand up when the teacher leaves the class.

No student shall leave the classroom without the permission of the staff member before the class is dismissed. Students should be regular and punctual in attending classes and in all activities connected with the College.

Strict silence must be observed during class hours in the classrooms and the College premises. An eligible student will be selected and appointed as the class representative at the beginning of each year.

When classes are dismissed, students are expected to leave the room in a quiet and orderly manner giving way to the staff members. While moving from one class to another, no disturbance must be caused to other classes.

Attendance

The staff-in-charge shall take the attendance at the beginning of each class and it will be uploaded to the computer on the same day. Late comers will not be permitted to enter the classroom. Attendance during tests and internal assessments is compulsory.

Attendance for the End Semester Examinations

- 90% of attendance is necessary to write the Semester examination.
- An exemption may be granted either on medical grounds or when a candidate is representing the College / University participating in sports, games, camps and other training programmes.

- The students should have a minimum of 60% attendance to apply for condonation. Students having less than 60% of attendance should redo the missed Semester and then continue the remaining semesters.

Leave of Absence

A student requiring leave must apply for it in advance in the prescribed form. In case of absence due to unforeseen cause, an application for leave must be submitted on the first day of return to the College. Leave applied for reasonable causes will be ordinarily granted.

A medical certificate must be submitted for extended leave (more than three days] on medical grounds. In case of prolonged leave parent/guardian should contact the College Principal not later than the fourth day of the leave taken by the candidate.

A student requiring leave for a period or portion thereof must apply to the staff in charge of that particular period in person before the class begins.

But if a student requires permission for an hour for more than one day, she must submit a letter seeking permission to the Head of the Department through their respective Tutor/staff in charge. Leave letters must be attested by the warden in the case of inmates of the hostel and by the parent/guardian in case of day students and sent on time.

If a student is absent from class even for a period without due permission will suffer a loss of attendance for the full day. Continued absence without a leave letter will render a student liable to have her name removed from the roll.

General Rules

Students are expected to be neat, clean and simple in their dress to the daily classes. The choice of dress should be restricted to churidars only. They must conform to the standard of modesty maintained by the institution.

Students should wear a white dress on special occasions especially on Independence Day.

Conformity to these rules is a necessary condition for admission to the College and the hostel.

Letters officially addressed to the Principal should be enclosed with reply postage.

Day students are not permitted to entertain visitors in the College. They will have their letters and other communication addressed to their homes. Usage of the mobile phone by the students is strictly restricted inside the Campus.

Books, magazines and other materials not approved by the Principal shall not to be circulated on the College campus. During free hours, students can make use of the College Library.

The finder of lost property is expected to hand over the same to the College office. On no account shall lunch be taken in any hall, Class room or verandah. Food and food wrappings should not be thrown out and they must be left in the bin kept for this purpose.

Students are expected to take proper care of the College property and help in keeping the premises neat and clean. Disfiguring the wall, door or breaking the furniture is a breach of discipline and will be duly punished. Ragging at any level is considered a serious offence.

Students should avoid expressing anything by word or deed that may disturb the unity and harmony in the premises and in the hostel.

Students must show due respect to their teachers and other staff of the College.

Students must wear their ID cards inside the College campus.

Students should maintain silence and be attentive while attending classes, functions of the College, Association Meetings and other gatherings.

Students are forbidden from organizing any meeting on their own in the College or collecting money for any purpose without the permission of the Principal.

Anyone who violates any of the rules of the College either in word or deed shall be deemed to have committed a breach of discipline and the Principal shall have full power to inflict any of the following punishments; fine, loss of attendance, refusal to issue Transfer Certificate and Conduct Certificate, suspension and expulsion. Students should check the College notice board every day.

Certificates

Any student past or present, desirous of getting a Transfer or Conduct Certificate must apply to the Principal in the form prescribed.

No Certificate will be sent through the post unless a self-addressed envelope with stamps for Registered Post is given along with the application.

Petition and Complaints

Request, petition, appeal and complaint of any kind must be made to the Principal.

Library

Perfect order and strict silence should be maintained in the library and discussion should be avoided inside the library. The library is well equipped with excellent seating arrangements and a perfect environment for focused study. The library functions are completely automated with the implementation of the latest software for library management.

Qualified librarians ensure the best possible information services. Standard textbooks and reference books by well-known authors are stocked, and every effort is made to obtain all titles recommended by the faculty. Multiple copies of popular books are bought to make them available to as many students as possible. A copier facility is also provided for the benefit of those who access the library.

Library Automation

The Central Library has been automated by LOGICLAUNCH software with bar-coded technology. With a separate server, our digital library provides an access to several online Journals for students and faculty

members. In addition, it is equipped with specialized video cassettes in all titles including science and arts, technology and management studies.

Digital Access

The library is also digitally equipped with computer services to ensure easy search, study and research activities. The Digital library is equipped with an LCD projector, audio - visual hall, stack room and a room with back volumes.

A Closed-Circuit Television (CCTV) facility is available for the entire library. All library facilities, supported by expert assistance, are available for students and staff from 8.30 a.m. to 05.00 p.m. on all working days.

Stack Area

The books are arranged as per the subject and the DEWEY DECIMAL CLASSIFICATIONS System is followed. Online Public Access catalogue facility is available for searching operations.

Books and Journals

Over 62,000 volumes of books and 92 National and International Journals are available on Management, Science, Humanities, Competitive Examinations for Higher Education, Personality Development and general interest subjects. Nearly 65 magazines are also available.

Membership

All the students and staff members are eligible for membership in the library. Books will be issued to the members only on producing the ID card.

Unless the students pass the Physical Education Tests prescribed by the University, Degree Certificates will not be issued by the Institution.

For all the sports and games events, special coaching will be offered by the College from 5.30 a.m. to 9.00 a.m. and 4.30 p.m. to 7.30 p.m. by specialized coaches of various athletic events and tournaments.

National Cadet Corps

Girls Division Senior Wing of the National Cadet Corps (NCC) offers opportunities to the students for Military training and Social Service without imposing on them an obligation for active military service.

The aims of NCC are

- To develop character, comradeship, an ideal of service and quality of leadership in young women, to stimulate interest in the defence force of the country.
- To build up a reserve of potential officers so that the defence service of the country can expand in a national emergency.
- The immediate benefit of the NCC training is the improvement in physique and mental alacrity, cultivation of the sense of discipline and responsibility and development of social and leadership qualities.

Members of the Corps have no liability for military service but have definite obligations for training as below :

- Their attendance at weekly parades is compulsory. Students who are members of the Corps are exempted from compulsory Physical Education. Each member will be provided with light refreshment on all parades, and the uniform will be maintained at Government expense.

- All members of the Corps must attend the Annual Camp held for twelve days during which the mess and travelling expenses will be met by the Government.

If the Cadet fails to attend a minimum of 75% of Parades, they will be disqualified from appearing for the 'B' and 'C' Certificate Examinations.

The assessment will be taken based on their NCC activities like attendance, camps attended (National and State level), Adventure training, Social Service activities, leadership qualities, cultural and National Integration Activities, B and C Certificates, and routine training. Unless the cadets pass in their assessment, they will not be granted the Degree Certificate by the University. NCC certificate will carry weight for recruitment to Government and other services and admission to all Professional Colleges.

National Service Scheme

NSS units work towards the motto "Not Me but You"

The NSS Volunteers are expected to enroll themselves as a member for two years and should participate regularly in the activities organized by the unit. The volunteers must attend the 7 days Annual Special Camp and will be issued a certificate after the completion of 2 years. The spectrum of activities during the Camp includes the organization of medical camps, health and hygiene and awareness programmes for the poor and needy for the betterment of rural areas.

The National Service Scheme offers an opportunity to the volunteers to participate in various orientation programmes, rallies, Scribe duties, and develop a thirst for service. It enhances the volunteers to develop character, team spirit and leadership qualities. Assessment of NSS volunteers will be done by the NSS Programme Officer

concerned and External Programme Officer as recommended by the NSS Co-Ordinator, Bharathiar University. The two years of participation of the students in NSS will be evaluated for a maximum of 100 marks based on their active participation in the NSS activities.
