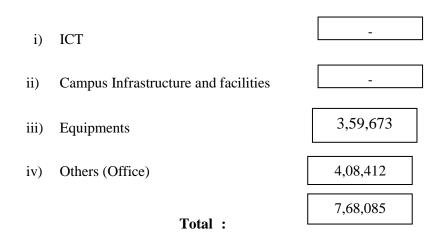

Objectives

Context

Innovative technologies help to explore new avenues and offer solutions to plenty of problems in society and the industry. Advancements in every field involve mushrooming problems requiring innovative solutions. There is an ever increasing necessity for research to provide innovative solutions for new problems cropping up. Development index of the country largely depends on the research activities carried out.

Practice

Intake of research oriented qualified faculty has enabled promotion of research culture in the institution. Conducting a lot of seminars and conferences where the faculty and students get exposed to eminent resource persons. Institution provides a conducive environment, non-interfering, healthy and adequate physical infrastructure, library and laboratory facilities to carry out research. The Staff are motivated to carry out research projects.

Research supervisors in the institution are highly motivated to promote quality research activities. As a post NAAC initiative, Nirmala Annual Research Congress (NARC) is held every year since 2013. UGC Sponsored inter-disciplinary innovative PG programme in Bio-Informatics has been started. With the meager resources available already, a centralized research lab (Mother Teresa Research Centre) has been set up. Development of a recognized centralized research lab and instrumentation centre forms a major part in the immediate future plan of the institution.

Evidence of success

- Funding from various funding agencies has increased ten-fold from six lakhs to sixty five lakhs.
