Public Financial Management System (PFMS) is a platform for epayment under Direct Benefit Transfer (DBT) to both Aadhar based and Non Aadhar based bank accounts through NPCI. It aims to create a management platform for all the financial activities of all plan schemes along with the integration with core banking solution. It provides realtime information of the resources regarding their availability and utilization. It results in better cash management and transparency. Payment of Honorarium for Resource persons, Travel and Dearness Allowance, expenditure towards hospitality, stationery charges and publication charges are executed through PFMS. Fundings received from Government organizations, expenditure and utilization are implemented through PFMS.

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

Keeping in view the importance of feedback, the institution obtained the feedback from all its stakeholders. The students gave the feedback on various aspects of the institution like curriculum, teaching, learning and evaluation system followed in the college, infrastructure, placement and all aspects of the teaching learning mechanism including the faculty's delivery system. The feedback is performed online, expressing their views in a democratic manner. The feedback from the alumni was received on 2nd March 2019, from all disciplines. The aspects concerning relevance of the college education curriculum to the business world and their employability was the main focus and suggestions for the betterment of the students community and growth of the institution was also suggested by the alumini. In a similar manner, the college arranged for the Parents Teachers Meet twice during the academic year and received the feedback from them . The college has been selected as a participating institution in the Unnat Bharat Abhiyan Scheme, through which the Central Government will fund the Institution for adopting five villages. To reinforce the sustainability of our environment, all the departments have taken "Go Green" as their watchword and brought forth varied initiatives to create a green ecological surrounding in the campus. As a regular practice, plastics were totally avoided by staff and students to propagate a plastic free environment inside the campus, followed by distribution of greenery to the resource person and replacing unsustainable conference materials (Flex / Vinyl banners or boards banner, Plastic files) with ecofriendly components. The students of the department of geography have been making newspaper carry bags since 2009 to ensure a plastic carry bag free campus. These carry bags are supplied free to the college canteen, school canteen and nearby shops. For conservation of nature and to engender awareness among students, diverse strategic plans and implementations were accomplished in the building of ponds, maintenance of the lawns and medicinal garden. Department of Tamil Aided and Tamil SF have revamped the syllabus by incorporating environment oriented poems, prose, novels and short stories. Department of Economics has organized a UGC sponsored one day seminar on Environmental Sustainability. Department of Botany creates awareness on medicinal plants, ornamental plants and coir pith in the campus. Coir pot making machine is purchased to replace plastic pot. Visit to forests, conservation parks, dams and lakes helped the students in conserving rare and endangered plants and keep in tune with the nature. Department of Zoology is active in the Conversion of organic solid wastes like leaf litters and vegetable wastes into organic manure by vermicomposting. Use of incinerators in hostel, Solid waste dump and cleaning the dump twice a week by the Cooperation. College takes pride in using solar energy. Solar PV Roof top power plant has contributed to environmental sustainability in the campus, and the cost savings will also contribute to financial stability of the college in the years ahead. Beyond the cost savings, solar power is the key component of our college's long term sustainability strategy, as we seek innovative ways to reduce carbon footprints. Total energy consumption during October 5th 2018 till June 20th 2019 is 97.05 MWh, Percentage of energy consumption from Solar PV Roof top power plant is 58, total Carbon dioxide savings is 24.13 tonnes and total number of equivalent trees planted is 618. 121 LED bulbs in the campus, Rain water harvesting system, installation of three solar powered lamps in the campus and wastes from the hostel are fed to the Biogas plant are some of the alternate energy resources used. Two certificate courses on solar energy and its applications were conducted by the Department of Physics.

It provides accessibility to international research and to capture core ideas from publications. Practice: Students are encouraged to enroll for various online courses offered by spoken tutorial and SWAYAM platforms at the beginning of the academic year. At the end of the semester, students complete the courses through an online exam. Webminar sessions are arranged for various programmes and Online evaluation is followed for a few courses. Evidence of Success: All the students and faculty have registered under the SWAYAM portal, the National Digital Library and the National Research council under the auspices of National Academic Depository. In 2018 to 19,1624 students registered under spoken tutorial 1181 students took up the examination and 1038 were awarded certificates. 33 SWAYAM courses were selected and 1009

students got enrolled. Around 1963 students have registered under the National Academic Depositary. Problems encountered and resources required: Connectivity to the server of the sponsor institution posed a problem and Computers wanting Internet facility. We wish to place on record that from 2015 to 2019, SNEHA Positive Face has spent Rs.10,91,400 towards medical expenses, gifts, functions and celebrations. 8. Future Plans of Actions for Next Academic Year

The college has been selected as a participating institution in the Unnat Bharat Abhiyan Scheme, through which the Central Government will fund the Institution for adopting five villages. The college intents to start an under graduate B.Com(Ecommerce) course, certificate course in Digital Marketing, Computer Applications in Business, Diploma course in Public Administration and PG Diploma in Tourism Travel Management. Proposals have been submitted to UGC for Bachelor of Vocational course(B.Voc) on Fashion Designing Technology , UGC STRIDE project and TNSCST student projects. Preparing the Institution for approval under Rastriya Uchchattar Shiksha Abhiyan, Government of India:for Component 8, enhancing quality in selected Autonomous colleges. Communicative English classes are to be introduced as special programme for the first year students along with the curriculum with an objective to imbibe the nuances of communication for personality development and also to make students to effectively communicate and confidently face the challenges and keep pace with the fast changing competitive world of science and technology. The Department of English(SF) has proposed to launch an International Journal (NIJLLAL) NIRMALA INTERNATIONAL JOURNAL OF LITERATURE, LANGUAGE AND APPLIED LINGUISTICS to promote, enrich and upgrade Academic Research for the research aspirants in the field of literature, languages and applied linguistics. Research committee has initiated an online quarterly Journal on Science and Humanities to encourage quality research articles. The placement cell proposes to organize Aptitude, logical reasoning and soft skill training programmes to enhance the employability opportunities of the students. Outcome based education is to be inculcated in the curriculum for the 2019 batch students. Additional incubation centre programmes are to be initiated for training and subsequent placement. Faculty student exchange programme need to be enhanced. A Women Entrepreneur centre has to be established. A Library has to be constructed in the adopted village (Kangayampalayam). Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikas Yojana: for skill development in voice training, non voice training and data entry are to be initiated. Interdisciplinary research is to be initiated among the departments and for collaboration with industries and corporate. The college also strives to obtain funded projects for research. The percentage of energy consumption from Solar PV Roof top power plant at present is 58 and will be increased further in future.
