CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 - Curriculum Design and Development

1.1.1 - Curricula developed and implemented have relevance to the local, national, regional and global developmental needs which are reflected in Programme Outcomes (POs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) and Course Outcomes (COs) of the various Programmes offered by the Institution.

Nirmala College for Women, ever since its inception, has been journeying with an aim to provide quality higher education to women across the region by methodical upgradation at regular intervals to cater to the needs of changing times. The Outcome Based Education was adopted by the institution form 2019 onwards, the curriculum designed under it had specific POS, PSO, and COs, for each programme and courses respectively. The papers were

ameliorated in such a way to accommodate the local, regional, national and global needs. Blended Learning has been introduced in the curriculum. Capability enhancement programmes like Cyber Security for UG students and Digital Security for PG students have been introduced. Internships were made mandatory for all the I PG students, with an aim to expose them to practical working conditions. Focus was also given to Industry 4.0 related topics in the curriculum. Already existing CBCS was applied to the Elective papers in order to offer more choices in courses. Various hands-on trainings, field visits and industrial visits were arranged to students to supplement their curriculum. Feedbacks were consistently obtained from the stake holders and based on the feedbacks, necessary changes were brought in to the curriculum, including the refining of the Skill Based Papers in order to meet the needs of the employers. Students earn extra credits and knowlege by opting for Self-Study, Swayam, Spoken Tutorial and Value Added programmes.

Professional Ethics:

Professional ethics is vital for a sustainable growth in one's career, the college offers 40 courses including Advertising, Modern Journalism, Medical Laboratory Technology, Molecular Genetics, Cyber Security, Information security which impart professional ethics which will help students to become ethically strong professionals in future.

Gender:

The college offers 15 courses which focus on women including, Women Studies, Introduction to Women's Studies, Women and Reproductive Health. These courses help students to comprehend the importance of womanhood and bring the innate potential of a woman to the forefront.

Environmental Sustainability:

Environmental Studies is offered to all the I UG students in Semester II, in order to create environmental awareness among students. The mandatory field visit to any environmental assets or polluted sites help students to practically understand the environmental issues. Among the various courses, 29 including Environmental Studies and Management, Ecology and Ethology, Bio-Resource and its Utilization focus on the environment, which helps students to understand its worth.

Human Values:

Value Education is offered to all I UG students in Semester I. It aids the students to revive their values and keeps them spirited. There are 28 courses which impart Human Values through its syllabi. Regular Moral Instruction and Catechism classes are conducted on every Friday to impart moral values and practices to students. The Student Affairs Committee organises regular Guest Lectures, Workshops, Motivational programmes to enhance the moral values of the students.

2.3.1 - Student-centric methods such as experiential learning, participative learning and problemsolving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences:

Course teachers of various departments of Nirmala College for Women, Coimbatore, use Experiential Learning methods to teach concepts and help students in acquiring varied skills in different fields by encouraging them to undertake Internship programmes in various firms and institutions; undergo practical training through workshops and practical classes and participate in field and Ecotrips and industrial as well as hospital visits to gain an awareness about processes, procedures and management systems.

Participative Learning methods used by teachers include giving Assignments to students; conducting group discussions and tasks in classes; conducting brain-storming Quiz competitions; understanding case studies; involving students in community surveys and activities; training students to make PowerPoint presentations; running a Students' on-campus store as well as organizing SEON, a Marketing Mela for enhancing their business and managerial skills; offer training to develop and advertise new products as well as coaching students in role-playing in street play and dramatic competitions. Hands on trainings and Workshops are organised for students under fundings.

Various departments have included Individual and Group Project activities in their curriculum to develop students' Problem-

solving skills in different topics. The Research Scholars are guided by their Research Guides to take up research topics involving defining, discussing and resolving different problems and issues in their study.

The Nirmala Annual Research Congress was initiated in 2013, with the intention of motivating students to present their original research articles in the in-house conference. The articles would be compiled into a compendium with an ISBN number. Four volumes of NARC have been compiled. The congress is always preceded by a talk from a Resource person involved in active research, either from the University or a Research Institute. Talks have been rendered on Intellectual property rights, advances in research methodology and publication ethics. From the year 2020 an inhouse journal was introduced namely International Journal of Humanities and Science.

Projects are made compulsory for all PG students. Projects are carried out in the departments as well as in the field. There are collaborations with research institutes, Universities and Industries. Viva-voce forms an important component of evaluation

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for projects.

Under the DBT Star college scheme, group projects and individual projects have been made compulsory for the under graduate students of Botany, Chemistry, Zoology, Computer Science, Geography and Mathematics. Projects are interdisciplinary in nature, allowing the students to move across the boundaries and carry out their research in different disciplines.

As a pre-requisite requirement for research both PG and UG students have Biostatistics, Research Methodology and Biotechniques as core papers. This gives them the ability to analyse data sets acquired by them during the research process.

To adopt innovation in sustaining a Zero-Waste Campus , College practices the 3R (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle) principle.

Degradable Waste

- The Department of Zoology is active in converting leaf litter and vegetable wastes from the college and hostel into 1310 kilograms of organic vermicompost.
- The Department of Botany is active in converting leaf litter from the medicinal garden into organic compost with the aid of EM4. The compost is taken twice a year, 115 kgs of organic compost was produced.
- The Department of Geography and Economics prepare and distributes paper bags to nearby shops and also trains students in Wire Basket Making.
- Used papers and cardboards are sent to authorised dealers for recycling. Unused sheets of end semester answer booklets are redesigned as notebooks and distributed to the needy.
- Solid waste dump is cleared on alternate days by the City Corporation.
- Communication is made digital and paperless.
- Regular monitoring of safe disposal, recycling of waste materials.
- The Department of Chemistry monitors the management of

kitchen waste in the Biogas plant.

- Rain water harvesting system is established.
- Water from the ornamental and cultured fish tanks is used for watering potted gardens, herbs and mulberry by the Department of Zoology.
- Micro Scale experiments reduce the usage of chemicals in laboratories.

Best Practice: 2

Title of the practice: Enhancing Communication Skills

Objectives:

- To strengthen the communicative skills of the students.
- To aid the teachers in adapting suitable teaching methods, catering to the proficiency level of the students in the English language.
- To amplify the intensity of the training process and curtail the challenges in teaching, learning and practice.
- To create opportunities for better communication for the learners to face the competitive world.

Context:

Our institution has always taken scrupulous efforts in channelizing the individual talents of the students into mainstreams that enriches the degree of learning. English learning in higher education plays a pivotal role in acquiring knowledge which eventually results in getting into decent jobs as well as in career planning. The academic heads after much perusal, introduced the system of segregating the I UG students into two groups: Advanced English and General English learners. This segregation is based on the Entry Level Test which mainly focuses on analysing the students' knowledge in grammar, vocabulary and comprehension skills. Based on the marks the students receive, the top scorers are grouped as Advanced English Learners and the average scorers are grouped as General English learners.

Practice:

- The Department of English integrates a Bridge Course for a period of 10 days.
- The curriculum is designed as longitudinal and latitudinal studies for the advanced and general English learners respectively.
- The longitudinal curriculum is structured in assurance with the basic English knowledge of the learners with new genres of English language and literature.
- The latitudinal curriculum is designed to encapsulate the basic grammatical and LSRW skills.
- The academicians with much diligence and expertise push the boundaries of learning the English language and help the students in receiving hands-on training by boosting their confidence.
- General English students are encouraged to participate in essay writing, poem recitation, one minute speeches, role plays; Advanced English learners are motivated to participate in debates, short story writing, paper presentations, stage acting, elocution, poem composing, slogan writing.
- Organising Excelsior, Literary Zephyr and Fantasia Ecstasialiterary competitions, Valsa Memorial- Drama competition and various interdepartmental competitions ranging from simpler to higher levels are conducted on regular intervals and the teachers ensure the participation of all the students.
- The Streaming of Part- II and Part III General/ Advanced English is enhanced for the Learners of Nirmala College for Women, through extra classes and training programs on communication skills.

Evidence of Success:

 The curriculum gradually gathers its momentum every semester which initiates the novice learner in acquiring the basic skills and gradually leads to obtaining mastery over the English language.

- Advanced and General English Courses offer the Advanced learners an opportunity to master the English language and pursue their own academic endeavours, while helping the General English learners thrive academically.
- Students' achievement in English language learning is endorsed by publishing their best write ups in the College Magazine. The best talents are also used as stage actors for the College Annual English play.
- Launch of new Linguistics lab with 60 computer terminals for multi languages.
- The faculty in the Department of English compile and design books for the corresponding levels.

Problems Encountered and resources required:

- The students of the General English batch come from a varied socio-economic-cultural background, and so adapting to focused and higher levels of language learning becomes difficult and yet introducing Classroom games and interactive sessions out of the syllabus keep their interests sustained and help them in acquiring English knowledge.
- The Advanced English learners, though sound in basic language skills, lack confidence. The teacher helps them overcome fears by employing simple classroom practices like reading, narrating stories and writing.
- Through online classes, the students initially found it difficult to cope with the classes. While teachers had to rework on the presentation for virtual classes.

Augmented Teaching Learning through the Pandemic

Nirmala College for Women has enriched the students' personal profile and their academic status by initiating programmes and activities to make them highly competitive, smart and successful.

The objectives of Nirmala College for Women are centered towards nurturing intellectual curiosity. Students were engaged in learning through traditional methods of teaching-learning blended with innovation and technology.

The Learning Management System(LMS) was established to upload all study materials (ppts, videos) through G suite classrooms with easy access for the students. Assignments, tests and seminars were conducted through google classroom. Students have unlimited access to the e-learning materials.

YouTube links were provided to students to achieve their learning objectives and revise the topics whenever necessary. Hands-on training was given to faculty members on e-content preparation and presentation.

Outcome Based Education (OBE) was introduced in the curriculum for the academic year 2019-20. To familiarize with this method, many workshops on the Bloom's Taxonomy and the process of OBE were organized in 2018. All the disciplines were asked to define the Vision, Mission, Programme Education Objectives, Programme Outcomes, Programme Specific Outcomes and Course Outcomes pertaining to their discipline.

Blended learning was introduced in the curriculum to encompass a flipped model of teaching learning. This gives access to students

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to explore more sites of reference over the Internet.

All the students have registered under the National Digital Library, giving them an opportunity to read a wide range of Text and Reference books.

The curriculum is designed with Projects for both Undergraduate and Postgraduate students. Projects are interdisciplinary in nature, allowing the students to move across boundaries and carry out research in different disciplines. Under the DBT Star college scheme, group projects and individual projects have been made compulsory for the undergraduate students of Botany, Chemistry, Zoology, Computer Science, Geography and Mathematics.

In order to empower the knowledge of students through distinctive practices, students were asked to enroll in different online portals like SWAYAM, NPTEL, Spoken tutorial, learnathon, Coursera (MOOC) courses. Credits are given once the course is completed.

The Institution Innovation Council (IIC) under the Ministry of Education was formed to nurture, inculcate, build and strengthen a culture of cohesive Innovation and Entrepreneurship Ecosystem among young entrepreneurs. The primary mandate of IIC is to encourage young students by supporting them to work with new ideas, while they are in their formative years.

The Nirmala Annual Research Congress was initiated in 2013-2014 by the IQAC, with the intention of motivating students to present their research articles in the in-house conference. The articles would be compiled into a compendium with an ISBN number. Four volumes of NARC have been compiled. The congress is always preceded by talks from Resource persons involved in active research, either from the University or a Research Institute. Talks have been rendered on Intellectual property rights, advances in research methodology and publication ethics. From the year 2020 an in-house journal was published, entitled International Journal of Humanities and Science.

To encourage and promote Research in Higher Education, the College formed a Research Committee in 2019. The committee strives to enhance the Research culture in basic and applied domains of science and humanities.

Internships are a part of the curriculum assignment and it is conducted for both UG and PG students.

Instilling knowledge in varied spheres equips the students to become potential individuals who are successful in their career profession. Through holistic education and innovative practices, the college enhances the progress of the students, making them well-trained and efficient individuals to meet a competitive world.
