15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

The College offers interdisciplinary courses - 20 Skill Based and 20 Non Major Elective courses from the third semester onwards. The above courses fall under the choice based credit system where students are given the liberty to choose any course from either Sciences or Humanities that interests them. Languages - English, Hindi, Tamil and French are offered in the first four semesters. Ability enhancement courses like Human Rights, Value Education, Environmental studies, Cyber security and Digital Security are offered. Extension and outreach activities are compulsory for all students and one credit is provided for their participation. 41 certificate courses are offered by the college. Research projects and internships are mandatory for the final year UG and PG students which is interdisciplinary, especially projects under the DBT Star College Scheme and Career Oriented Program of UGC.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The College is registered with the National Academic Depository of MHRD from 2018 with Bharathiar University as the nodal centre. The College is yet to register with the Academic Bank of Credits. It will follow the guidelines of the State Government and Bharathiar University as the affiliating body. The college has signed a MoU with 3 foreign Universities and guest lectures and webinars have been organized The teachers are encouraged to prepare e-content and reading materials which are systematically uploaded in the LMS and registered You Tube of the college. Copyrights have been obtained

for books published. The College follows the Outcome Based Education. Course Outcome attainment and Program Outcome attainment are calculated for the past three years by Direct and Indirect method.

17.Skill development:

Every program offers 6 skill based courses from semester III to semester VI which enhances the employability and entrepreneurship skills of students. Out of which 2 are interdisciplinary in nature. Soft skill training is given through certificate courses like Multimedia, PGDCA and Visual Basic. Online skill based courses like Spoken Tutorial offered by IIT, Mumbai and Learnathon are projected for student participation. MSME course like GST practitioner is offered to Commerce students. Value added courses are offered in every program in the form of Certificate, Diploma and Advanced Diploma courses. 51 Value added courses have been incorporated in the curriculum. A student is expected to complete two courses in her period of study. 78 courses under SWAYAM and NPTEL have been cleared by students. Digital Security and Cyber Security have been incorporated for the UG and PG students.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

The college offers two Indian languages - Hindi and Tamil compulsory for all programmes in the first four semesters. Syllabus is designed in such a way that it promotes Indian culture and inculcates moral values. Indian culture can be traced in Indian Literature written in the form of poems, plays and stories. Links are provided for online learning of short stories, Novels and Drama. Indian festivals like Diwali, Pongal, Onam and Holi is celebrated. Cultural ethos in the Tamil language is manifested in the celebration of great poets like Bharathi through Debates organized in TV channels and Radios. Guest lectures in Hindi and Spoken Hindi is organized for students and faculty. National days of importance are celebrated by the Language departments. Debate discussions on social issues are organized by inviting Speakers with social standing in the State. Indian Knowledge system has been offered as a Foundation course under Part IV.

19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Outcome Based Education was implemented in the year 2019. The syllabus specifies Vision, Mission, Programme Education Objectives, Programme Outcomes, Programme Specific Outcomes and Course Outcomes. Mapping is done between 1) Vision, Mission and PEOs 2) PEOs and POs and 3) COs and POs/PSOs. Programme Outcome attainment by Direct and

Indirect method is accomplished for 2 batches of PG and one batch of UG. The Lesson Plan and Work Diary of the teacher indicates the teaching strategy and activity to be employed. Question papers and question banks are framed according to Blooms Taxonomy. The Continuous Internal Assessment incorporates quiz, seminars, assignments, case studies, Group discussion and field projects. The students are informed about the outcomes by the course teachers. The Program outcomes and Program Specific Outcomes are well disbursed to the students at the beginning of the academic year.

20.Distance education/online education:

Blended Learning has been introduced in the curriculum from 2020. One unit of all the courses provides the links for online learning and a flipped mode of teaching -learning is adopted. E-content and PPTs prepared by the Faculty are available in the LMS and registered You Tube of the college. Conferences and seminars are organized through Google Meet, Zoom, Webex and Go To meeting. Licentiate is obtained for 5 G-Suite authorized Users. MOOC courses are compulsory for students and they can choose either SWAYAM or NPTEL. Additional 2 credits are provided on the completion of 2 MOOC courses. 78 courses under SWAYAM and NPTEL have been cleared by students. Online exams have been initiated for Foundation courses under Part IV of the Curriculum - Environmental studies and Indian Knowledge system.

CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 - Curriculum Design and Development

1.1.1 - Curricula developed and implemented have relevance to the local, national, regional and global developmental needs which are reflected in Programme Outcomes (POs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) and Course Outcomes (COs) of the various Programmes offered by the Institution.

Nirmala College for Women offers a diverse array of academic programs, including 21 undergraduate, 12 postgraduate, 10 M.Phil., 12 Ph.D., and 2 PG Diploma programmes, all of which align with Local, National, Regional, and Gobal developmental needs. Since adopting Outcome Based Education in 2019, the institution has expanded its curriculum to include 130 local, 95 regional, 168 national, and 229 global courses. This global perspective is

further strengthened through MoUs with international universities and industries, enriching students' practical knowledge.

Innovative curricular features such as 'Blended Learning', 'Industry 4.0', 'Beyond the Curriculum' and Self-Study portions are embedded to prepare students for future challenges. The curriculum also integrates Ability Enhancement Programs in areas like Cyber Security, Digital Security, Women Studies, and Environmental Studies. Field projects, Internships, Projects and Industry visits provide hands-on experience, while the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) and elective courses offer flexibility.

Regular feedback from stakeholders drives continuous curriculum improvement through Board of Study and Academic Council meetings. Additionally, students can pursue Self-Study Courses, MOOCs, and Value-Added courses to broaden their learning. Extension activities, including NCC, NSS, and various social service programs, are integral to the curriculum. In response to evolving industry demands, the college introduced two new undergraduate programmes B.Sc. Data Science and B.Com. International Business and a postgraduate programme - M.A. Human Resource Management in the academic year 2023-2024.

1.3 - Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 - Institution integrates cross-cutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability, and Human Values into the curriculum

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At Nirmala College for Women, the curriculum is enriched with courses that address cross-cutting issues vital for fostering responsible global citizens. In the academic year 2023-2024, the institution offered 90 courses on Professional Ethics, 36 on Gender, 74 on Human Values, and 52 on Environment and Sustainability. These courses are integral to developing students' knowledge, skills, and values, preparing them to navigate and address complex global challenges.

The 90 courses on Professional Ethics cover essential ethical principles across various fields, including Modern Journalism, Information Security, Business Ethics, Cyber Law, Corporate Law, and Artificial Intelligence. These courses aim to instill a strong ethical foundation in students' professional lives.

Gender studies are emphasized through 36 courses that explore the social, political, and economic dimensions of gender. Topics include Introduction To Women's Studies, Gender Economics, Hormones And Health and Women in India, equipping students with a deep understanding of gender issues.

Human Values are deeply integrated into 74 courses, such as Social and Economic, Issues in India, Organizational Behavior, and Life Skills, which focus on the core values essential for individuals and societies.

Finally, 52 courses on Environment and Sustainability educate students on pressing environmental challenges. Courses like Plant Ecology, Environmental Geography, and Environmental Policies provide a comprehensive understanding of sustainability and ecological issues.

2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses students' learning levels and organises special programmes for both slow and advanced learners.

Our institution supports diverse students through tailored learning platforms. We assess knowledge levels using entry-level tests, continuous internal assessments, and activities like assignments, seminars, and quizzes. Based on their performance, students are categorized into advanced or slow learners.

For Slow Learners, the institution conducts remedial classes, regular mentoring, and provides study materials to enhance understanding. This has led to improved exam performance and increased participation.

Advanced Learners are identified through high scores in entrylevel and internal tests. They engage in self-study, specialized courses, research publishing, competitive exam preparation, and academic competitions. Outcomes include 144 Students' research publications, 18 students clearing competitive exams, and 240 conference Paper presentations.

Programmes for All Students include orientation sessions, skill development courses in communicative English and Excel, and career guidance with job fairs. The Entrepreneurship Development Cell supports start-up initiatives, while the Innovation Cell fosters a culture of creativity. Additionally, students engage in online courses through platforms like SWAYAM, NPTEL, and Coursera.

Overall 714 students have secured placements and 602 completed NPTEL and MOOC courses and2133 students have cleared various Value added Courses demonstrating significant academic and professional achievements.

Workshops, hands-on training, and group discussions foster team spirit and cooperative learning. Brainstorming sessions, quizzes, and exhibitions make learning engaging. Entrepreneurial skills are honed through on-campus stores and marketing events, while job fairs promote

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employability. Role-playing, soliloquies, and club activities further develop communication and theatrical skills.

Problem-Solving Methods: Curriculum includes individual and group projects to cultivate problem-solving skills. Research scholars also employ these methods in their dissertations to address complex issues.

These approaches not only enhance academic knowledge but also equip students with essential life skills, preparing them for real-world challenges.

Google Classroom facilitates assignment collection, online tests, and evaluation, while Google Forms streamline program registration and feedback collection.

ICT tools support classroom instruction, including smart boards for projecting calculations, LCD projectors for screening visual content, and interactive panels for IT-integrated materials. Teachers use computers, laptops, and mobile phones for blended learning, creating interactive presentations, and incorporating games. Printers, scanners, and educational portals enhance content preparation, while cameras and recording devices help create elearning resources.

Educational platforms like YouTube, MOOC, and British Council websites enrich both teachers' and students' learning experiences. Tools like Kahoot foster interactive learning through educational games. Virtual laboratories and software such as MATLAB, SPSS, and Tally are instrumental for teaching concepts. Our Examination Management System (EMS) has been enhanced through advanced IT tools, streamlining the evaluation process. Continuous Internal Assessments and End-Semester exams for both theory and practicals are conducted as scheduled in the Academic Calendar. Students can access hall tickets, timetables, seating arrangements, and attendance records via the online portal. Examiner selection and communication for paper evaluation are automated, with marks entered directly into the EMS portal for each question and component. This system generates consolidated score sheets, allowing course and program performance evaluation. Results are declared within 9 to 10 days following the final exam, and students can review them online. Supplementary exams and revaluation applications are provided for students who require further consideration.

The integration of IT tools has improved various examination procedures, such as managing student information, course allocation, online fee payments, hall ticket downloads, and seating arrangements. It facilitates barcode identification, online quizzes, and mark entry for tests and exams. The system compiles course statistics, analyzes results, generates ranking reports, and calculates the attainment of Course Outcomes and Programme Outcomes.

The exam section employs IT resources, including CAMPES DOT NET Framework, Visual Basic, ASP.NET.MYC, Dell EMC PowerEdge servers, Konika Minolta Bizhub, and specialized scanners and printers.

This structured approach ensures that both faculty and students are well-informed and actively engaged in achieving the defined outcomes, fostering a productive learning environment.

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The institution is dedicated to academic research excellence, supported by its Research Committee through stringent policies on quality, integrity and ethics.

College fosters dynamic research environment with state-of-the-art laboratories, a digital research hub and a vast collection of scholarly resources. Apart from the funds received from Department of Biotechnology (DBT), the Department of Science and Technology (DST), the institution also promotes research by funding Rs.3.28 lakhs which helps faculties and students to present and publish papers in reputed journals

College publishes International Journal of Humanities and Sciences (IJHS), a biannual, peer-reviewed, open-access journal promoting interdisciplinary research. On-campus library offers over 65145 books and digital access to Inflibnet, NLIST, NPTEL, and DELNET. Advanced research infrastructure includes RT-PCR, spectroscopy, electrochemistry tools, and tissue culture labs.

Teachers and Scholars receive research grants & seed money of Rs.101.84 lakhs that leads to innovative findings. The institution has a robust publication record with 126 articles indexed in Scopus, Web of Science and UGC, 93 books, 28 book chapters, and 85 conference proceedings. All articles undergo rigorous plagiarism checks using eAarjav software. During 23-24, 45 research scholars registered in various Programmes and 25 successfully awarded Ph.D. degree that reflects institution's commitment to academic and research excellence.

The Library Committee verifies the library stock for the Central Library and the Department Libraries independently. Institutional reviews: Every teacher is required to create a lesson plan at the start of the semester that outlines the teaching methodology, student activities, and the approximate time of the classes. The teacher's work diary lists the classes they attend each day, along with the reference materials and instructional techniques they use. The Principal and Vice-Principal monitor the first two. Experts from universities and colleges are invited by the IQAC to conduct an external audit of the departments, office, and COE. The IQAC conducts internal audits while keeping an eye on the development and expansion of departments.

Learning Outcomes through OBE: Learning outcomes in OBE are specific, measurable statements that outline expected knowledge and skills. By emphasizing these outcomes, OBE ensures that educational activities are aligned with desired goals, fostering a more student-centered approach.

Both direct (based on grades) and indirect techniques (based on input from students, alumni, and evaluators) are used to determine PO achievement. PO attainment is determined bythe CO-PO correlation matrix. Based on the average correlation of all COs to each PO and PSO, the average CO for each PO and PSO is determined. The methods for achieving all POs and PSOs are the same. The indirect method of PO achievement relies on the opinions of students, alumni, and evaluators. Students are asked to complete a program exit survey at the time of program completion.

Nirmala College for Women is deeply committed to its mission in fostering and empowering students as active agents of social change. The Noon Meal Scheme was initiated in the year 2007 with the intention of supporting the economically backward students and those travelling from long distances to attend college. The scheme was introduced with a contribution of Rs.50,000/- initially to fulfill the noble cause of providing wholesome and nutritious meal to the students on all working days during their period of study. To ensure the long-term sustainability of the scheme, a corpus fund of Rs. 20,35,661.39/- have been established that aims to secure the ongoing support for the meal scheme and enhance its impact.

The scheme has opened doors to education and better opportunities for students who might have found it impossible to pursue their

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studies. It has also provided a platform to improve better physical and cognitive development. The meals provided through this scheme help in fostering healthy development. This, in turn has enhanced their academic performance, allowing students to realize their potential.

Around 91 students are benefitted from this scheme this year amounting to a sum of Rs.5,26,012.08 /-. The scheme is sustained through the generous contribution of the retired staff members and faculty members that has created stronger personal connection between staff and students, fostering a more supportive and caring environment.
